"A Midsummer Night's Dream"

When Shakespeare wrote his play, A Midsummer=s Night Dream, it was filled with the intrigue of characters set in the midst of a fantastical fairyland. Among the chicaneries of the characters were many dreams, hopes and expectations, as well as life filled with adventure. As we approach the month of August, we are somewhat in a "Midsummer's Season and Time" and we at Saint David's continue on our Sabbatical journey, taking advantage of that "Midsummer Season and Time". And although we are not reenacting the actual Shakespearean drama, we are engaging in a series of Summer Worship Events which will enrich our spiritual and cultural lives. The first gathering has already taken place, our Bluegrass Liturgy, and we now have that behind us and inside us, as we grow in God's Grace and Presence. As we come into our "Midsummer's Time" in August, we are anticipating two additional Special Liturgies here at Saint David's. On August 12th, we will celebrate the Office of Vespers. accompanied with the traditional music of Jazz. And on August 26th, we will celebrate a traditional and ancient Celtic Eucharist. The "Jazz Vespers" will give us an opportunity to take part in one of the traditional Canonical Hours of Vespers. It is a wonderful time to close the day in prayer meditation and to be uplifted by a very traditional type of music our Country has inherited from many years ago. Jazz is a multicultural, multigenerational expression of our music and our musical heritage. And then we celebrate an ancient Celtic Eucharist. Unlike the modern Celtic Liturgies which you might experience today, this Celtic Eucharist is based on an ancient type of worship that the Celts would have practiced. We have chosen to end our Parish's Sabbatical Time with a Celtic Eucharist, because the Reverend Andi Taylor and her husband Ionathan, together with our Pilgrims, began their Sabbatical Time with a pilgrimage to Wales. As Andy returns in September, it would be nice for us to understand that liturgical heritage that she has been studying during her personal enrichment time, and to experience and engage in how the Celts originally worshiped. This ancient Tradition has been a prototype of how our present-day liturgies evolved. I hope you will be able to attend both of these Saturday night (5 o'clock) Services. Come and bring your friends, and please share these events with as many others as possible. I bid you God's Blessing, His Grace and His Goodwill, as our Midsummer nights come to pass for each and every one of us here at Saint David's Church. Blessings, the Rev. Dr. David Angelica

- The Vestry discussed oversight of committees and funds within the church, and the importance of making policies known.

The Festival was an entirely friendly, safe event for hundreds of participants of all ages.

Ours was one of some 75 booths of vendors and not-for-profit organizations. Booths were packed randomly side by side along several walkways. On our right was a booth selling Cutco knives (!) and other kitchenware. The booth on our left sold LGBTQ+ books. Our free cold water attracted a lot of folks and their pets. (Next year we'll bring a doggie water bowl.) The rainbow was the most requested design for our face-painter, Julie Grogan. Visitors took our ALL ARE WELCOME info about Summer 2023 and our Takeaway Meal/Paper Pantry.

Scattered throughout the Festival were booths of several other faith-based organizations, including Cape Cod Synagogue; First Church UCC, Sandwich; First Parish Brewster Unitarian Universalist; Nauset Interfaith MLK Action Team; Pilgrim Congregational Church, Harwich; and UU of Falmouth Fellowship. Many visitors made a point of telling us how thankful they are for the support of the churches. Several public officials also made the rounds to express thanks.

Cape Cod Pride, Inc., the organizing sponsor of the festival, is a Massachusetts 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation. All its board members are volunteers. The purpose of the organization is to build bridges of understanding, connection, and support among the LGBTQIA community, its allies, and the community at large (more at capecodpride.org). A second sponsor is WEthrive, the LGBTQ+ and Ally Center for Cape Cod and the Islands, based in Hyannis, which focuses on development and support programs for folks aged 22 and under (more at www.WeThrive.us).



This year the Festival honored 2 senior Cape Codders, Paul Glass and Charles Evans, with the "Making A Difference Award." Both gentlemen, together since 1968, took part in the Stonewall protests in NYC in 1969. They've been activists ever since, now residing in Falmouth and supporting LBGTQ+ older adults, particularly older adults of color. They married in 2012.

MESSAGE FROM THE MUSIC DIRECTOR ...

What a musically vibrant summer we are enjoying at St. David's thanks to our three special Saturday evening services. On July 29 we had the bluegrass sounds of Earth Harmony featuring guitarist Christina Nordstrom and bassist Ted Mello. Jazz vespers will be on August 12 with bassist Frank Toppa and singer Edye Nesmith Then it's Celtic Eucharist on August 26 with Beverly DiPaolo on flute and recorder.



This month we are honored to share some background information on these supremely talented musicians.

Christina Nordstrom is a self-taught guitarist, singer and songwriter inspired by the folk music of the 50's and 60's. Originally from New Hampton, New Hampshire, Christina established herself as a busy musician in the South Shore of Massachusetts. She then joined forces with bassist Ted Mello, banjoist Bruce Joy, guitarist Michelle Glidden, and twelve-string guitarist Ric Bailey to create the folk group Earth Harmony. A major focus of the group came to be their music ministry, playing for South Shore and Greater Boston area church worship services and special events. Once called "a singing preacher" by Rev. James Forbes, former senior pastor of the Riverside Church in New York City, many of her original songs also attempt to provide a retelling of Biblical stories and scripture, as well as explore life's spiritual connections. Ted Mello is a native of Plymouth and the only remaining musician from Earth Harmony. Like Christina, Ted worked in human services and was the Cape & Islands Area Director for the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission. He is now happily retired and enjoying life as a bass player with Crabgrass, a bluegrass group popular on Cape Cod; and The Lindsays, an Irish group from the South Shore.

Frank Toppa is also a bassist, although more on the classical end of the musical spectrum. Frank plays with the Falmouth Chamber Players and locally with the Cape Community Orchestra. He grew up in Newport, Rhode Island where he was awed by the bassists at the Newport Jazz Festivals. Frank does not consider himself a true jazz bassist, but this writer disagrees with that assessment. Frank is the general music teacher at Chatham Elementary School and Truro Central School.

Edye Nesmith is a Cape wash ashore of almost 30 years who lives in East Sandwich. She has sung over the years with the Cape Cod Choral and the Chatham Chorale as well as with her church choir and occasional solo work. She is privileged to work with the Cape Cod Council of Churches as its Executive Director. She has two adult daughters and calls First Lutheran West Barnstable her faith family.

Beverly DiPaolo hails from New Jersey and earned a Masters Degree in Voice Performance at Montclair State University. Indeed, Beverly is a multi-faceted musician. Her primary instruments are flute, recorder and oboe. In addition she plays guitar, ukulele and piano. Beverly has been making music on the Cape since moving here full time in 2007. She is a music educator at Nauset Regional Middle school teaching chorus and general music. Beverly also performs with numerous ensembles including the Harwich Town Band, Cape Community Orchestra, New Horizons Band, and First Parish Brewster Wind Ensemble.
