FROM THE RECTOR DECEMBER 2023

The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and will save those whose spirits are crushed. Psalm 34:18

I enter this Advent season with heavy grief for our brothers and sisters in Ukraine, Israel and Palestine. Our public life is crowded with images of destruction and suffering. Our private lives are full of prayers for peace which seem to evaporate as they leave our lips. We pray, "Come, Lord Jesus, Prince of



Peace," yet watch our fellow humans rage and fight. My heart feels torn between the desire to find and bring joy to life, and the need to grieve daily.

I stumbled across an image that helped me rethink how I piece together my divided heart. On an Appreciative Inquiry Clergy Leadership website maintained by the Rev. Dr. Rob Voyle, he recalled something written by his brother-in-law Don after losing his 8 year old son.

I decided that the grief would always be there. No matter what I did, it was never going to go away. Having accepted that, I then decided I would surround and envelop that grief in love.

I then decided that I would construct a new life around that love and grief - with it being the center of my being, my strength, my integrity, my love for my family, my love for life. I would slowly build a new life in layers, a bit like laminating layers of plywood together. I would take my time and make it strong.

I believe we all carry our grief in different ways. I really like this image of layering our grief with love to interweave the pain and joy of our experiences. We can give ourselves permission to be angry or sad, or not cope well at times, and still know that there will be layers of comfort and hope, before and after those days, which will hold us together.

If you or someone you care about is experiencing a sense of feeling overwhelmed by grief, or the news, or the cold, shortening days of winter, please invite them to our Blue Christmas/Longest Night Service. We will laminate layers of grief and love together - to strengthen our souls. Please come and join in reminding each other of the healing power of Jesus' light and life.

As we pray, "Come, Lord Jesus, Prince of Peace," may we find strength and hope in companionship at God's table. Then as the Feast of Christ's Incarnation arrives, we will stand together strengthened to receive the gifts of healing and grace that God alone can give.

Blessings to all for a safe and holy Advent and Christmas.

On Sun., Dec. 17, at both services, we'll celebrate folks who recently concluded the Sacred Ground journey they began in June. They're our fourth Sacred Ground Dialogue Circle. They join dozens of our parishioners who've become alums of Sacred Ground since 2020.

"Sacred Ground is a film- and readings-based dialogue series on race, grounded in faith. Small groups [called Dialogue Circles] are invited to walk through chapters of America's history of race and racism, while weaving in threads of family story, economic class, and political and regional identity." [Sessions] focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/ Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories."

Since it was introduced by The Episcopal Church in 2019, thousands of people across our country have completed Sacred Ground. Many now engage in a variety of reparative initiatives, large and small, inspired by Sacred Ground. This series is part of Becoming Beloved Community, The Episcopal Church's long-term commitment to racial healing, reconciliation and justice.

Imagine journeying on a labyrinth with four inter-related quadrants:

- > Telling the Truth about our Churches and Race.
- > Proclaiming the Dream of Beloved Community.
- > Practicing Jesus's Way of Healing Love.

> Repairing the Breach in Society & Institutions.

On the path toward reconciliation and healing, we move among the quadrants, make sharp turns, meet fellow journeyers. We double back into quadrants we visited before, discovering fresh revelations.

TAKEAWAY MEAL/PAPER PANTRY REPORT FOR DECEMBER 2023

On November 15, 2023, we held Takeaway Meal number 81. Again, there was an increase in the total of meals served and personal hygiene products distributed. We are blessed to be able to provide for the needy of Cape Cod and are thankful for the support we have received over the years from St. David's and the organizations and people of Cape Cod. We planned for 260 meals and served 273. Everything went smoothly throughout the event. Several people arrived after the 260 meals were distributed and we provided for them from the extra food items we had purchased and set aside. We served turkey, cranberry sauce, mashed potatoes, corn, bread, snack pack, cookies & brownies. Fresh fruit was donated by a parishioner. While packaging the cookies and brownies on Tuesday, we discovered that we did not have enough. A trip to BJs was necessary as their chickens were available for larger families. We will plan on 275 regular meals per month going forward.

In addition, the attendees took home bags of personal hygiene items for themselves and family members. Items distributed included 100 bars of personal soap, 60 tubes of toothpaste, 60 bottles of shampoo, 100 rolls of paper towels and 160 rolls of toilet paper. With SNAP benefits being reduced, these items will be even more important to the attendees. Donations are always welcome and can be left in the Common Room anytime. Volunteers are welcome to help assemble these bags at 12:30 on the Tuesday before the event.

The Fishermen's Alliance provided several cases of seafood stew and chowder and we distributed many containers. There was a sampling station! The Barnstable County Nutritionist was available to provide information and to help distribute the samples. Stop and Shop provided many loaves of bread which were distributed. Covid test kits were given out free of charge.

We have received financial donations from parishioners, The Cape and Islands Deanery, The United Way, The Hunger Food Network (also supports The Paper Pantry), The Episcopal City Mission, and a friend of St. David's. We received several gift cards from The Major Crisis Relief Fund to purchase food items from Stop and Shop. We recently received a grant from The Aid to The Homeless Fund and John B Tew Family Fund of The Cape Cod Foundation. The Retired Men's Club of Cape Cod and The Yarmouth Rotary also donated funds. The Family Pantry in Harwich regularly donates food items, We give special thanks to the Special Ministries Committee of St. David's for their ongoing financial support of the program.

Paper bags were generously provided by the members of St. David's. PLEASE NOTE: Donations of large brown paper bags are being accepted again! Members and friends of the parish packaged and distributed all items. An announcement about the programs was placed in The Cape Cod Times and sent to the COAs in surrounding communities. An announcement was also placed on the Yarmouth Chamber of Commerce outdoor sign.

The next meal will be on Wednesday, December 20th. We plan on serving roasted turkey breast, ham or chicken. Helpers are needed to prepare and pack food on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, starting at 9:00 AM and to distribute meals Wednesday afternoon, starting at 12:45 PM. Once again, we need COOKIES and BROWNIES (NO NUTS), preferably home baked/style. Items from the grocery store are also welcome. Please note they should be dropped by 9:00 AM Tuesday morning in either Nelson Hall or The Common Room.

We will also distribute the coats from the coat drive we ran. We hope to provide some additional Christmas joy to the attendees as well. "Thank You" again, to everyone who makes this event happen! If you have questions, please contact Richard or Kathleen Banks, Meredith Krueger or Chris Morassi.
