FROM THE RECTOR MARCH 2024

In the tender compassion of our God, the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace. Luke 1:78-79

The dawn is breaking upon us earlier each day as we approach the hope of Spring. The return of more daylight reminds me of the great abundance of



God's love for us. Birds are slowly reappearing, and we hear more birdsongs each time we venture into the deceivingly cold, sunny days. I feel gratitude as I thank God for helping us all through the dark months of winter. What an experience of God's extravagant, abundant love.

I read in this month's *Day by Day* (p. 56) that Holy Week is a time to contemplate how we offer ourselves to a God who loves us more than we can ask or imagine. Perhaps our own acts of self-devotion to Christ might transform the world physically, mentally, and spiritually so that others might see what wondrous love it is that we encounter in Jesus.

Let's start our Holy Week a little early this year. On March 23 we will



host our first Messy Church gathering at St. David's. Messy Church is a chance to share fun, food, fellowship, and prayer with folks who may not be able to worship on Sunday mornings. I hope you plan to come and bring a friend as we gather in Nelson Hall to make

Easter crafts and eat a Spaghetti Supper. Parishioners are asked to bring your favorite pasta sauce or a salad to share. The Messy Church Team will provide the pasta!

I pray that our practice of abundant hospitality at St. David's will help spread the tender compassion of our God and the wondrous love we encounter in Jesus. May you enjoy a blessed Holy Week and Easter!

In Wales, St. David, our patron saint, is being celebrated! Daffodils, leeks, and Welsh cakes immediately come to my mind. St. David said "Be joyful, keep the faith and do the little things that you have heard and seen." I have been reflecting about how to keep faith and 'do the little things'. Our deacon, Marilyn McMillan, must have been reading my mind as in her sermon on Sunday, February 18th, she encouraged us to make inner space in order to be open to God.



When pondering space I think how St. David's shares its physical space with a variety of groups-the Yarmouth Retired Men's Club, to the Orchid Society and Girl Scouts to name just a few. Last Monday, I stopped in the sanctuary and saw a group of young people from Project Forward helping to clean the sanctuary. Project Forward, sponsored by Cape Cod Community College, is a nationally recognized program that provides vocational training for students with intellectual disabilities. What a wonderful way to share our physical space.

But like Marilyn, I have been focusing on a different kind of space, a space that is personal and, I believe, at the heart of our faith, our inner space. There are spiritual practices that can assist us as we work to make inner space for our relationships.

For the past several weeks, a group of parishioners has been meeting on Wednesdays and learning about several kinds of spiritual practices. Some practices were new to me, and some were familiar. Spiritual practices that were tactile in nature, like walking the labyrinth and using prayer beads, were relatively easy for me to understand and use to find my inner space. However, the spiritual practices of meditation and mindfulness were a huge challenge for me. For Lent, I' m making an intentional choice to work on growing inner space through meditation and mindfulness. I am purposely making time daily to be quiet, to listen and be mindful so God can enter my inner space. Admittedly, it will be a challenge for me. My mind often wanders and wants to jump to making to do lists or my shopping list or for all kinds of other distractions. I call this my monkey brain, as I'm all over the place, and it certainly is not leaving the door to my head and my heart open to hearing God's word. However, I have faith that God will guide me.

As we learned about these practices, we also experienced the value of learning in a supportive group. I invite you to come check out the Spiritual Practices group on Wednesdays at 11:30 am in Kimber Chapel. The Stations of the Cross on Fridays at 5:00 pm is another opportunity during Lent. SPIRITUAL FORMATION COMMITTEE



NEWS FROM THE DEACON - Healing Our Guts

The Boston Globe Magazine on Sunday, February 25, 2024, offers an informative article, "Your Guide to Better Gut Health," by Veronique Greenwood. It's all about research-based nutritional ideas for how to help the microbes in our intestines - the "gut microbiome" - keep us physically healthy. Greenwood closes with this: "the next frontier of understanding our health will increasingly be linked to the world living inside each of us."

In a similar way, our spiritual health is deeply connected to the world living inside each of us. It's the inner spirit world so eloquently described by Howard Thurman in his book, Meditations of the Heart: "There is in every person an inward sea, and in that sea there is an



This season of Lent is an opportunity to pay special attention to our inner altar, to get better acquainted with our angel who guards it, and to explore our inward sea - that "fluid area of our consent," so that our crucial links with the Eternal, with ourselves, and with others become ever stronger and healthier. The rituals and practices of Lent offer individual and communal settings for opening our innermost spaces to feel the loving, merciful safety of God with us, no matter what. Consider it a dose of probiotics bolstering our spiritual

In Session 10 of the updated curriculum for Sacred Ground, which we first used last fall, one addition is a 50 -minute podcast entitled "Notice the Rage; Notice the Silence," available HERE. (https://onbeing.org/ programs/resmaa-menakem-notice-the-rage-notice-the-silence/) In this episode from June 2020 of the program On Being, Krista Tippett interviews Resmaa Menakem, MSW, LICSW. Mr. Menakem "is a Minneapolisbased therapist and trauma specialist who activates the wisdom of elders, and very new science, about how all of us carry in our bodies the history and traumas behind everything we collapse into the word 'race.' [He offers] his intelligence on changing ourselves at a cellular level — practices towards the transformed reality most of us long to inhabit. Mr. Menakem is the author of My Grandmother's Hands: Racialized Trauma and the Pathway to Mending Our Hearts and Bodies (2017).

In the podcast and in the book, Mr. Menakem addresses trauma we all inherit, e.g.,:

"One common (and often overlooked) trauma response is what I call trauma ghosting. This is the body's recurrent or pervasive sense that danger is just around the corner, or something terrible is going to happen any moment." That physical sense of danger can be sparked by our own experiences, as well as by some long ago experiences of our forebears. We may well have observed and inherited their "impending danger" reaction without knowing its source. In the podcast and in the book Mr. Menakem offers practical ways to notice our inexplicable reactions and reduce their adverse impacts on our inner seas and our interactions with others and God.

With ever-healthier spiritual guts, may we pray: Grant, O God, that your holy and life-giving Spirit may move every human heart, and especially the hearts of the people of this land, that barriers which divide us may crumble, suspicions disappear, and hatreds cease; that our divisions being healed, we The Rev. Marilyn may live in justice and peace; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

1. Last month I shared some forgotten verses from The Hymnal 1940 Companion. I then went on to explore another section of the book that focuses on the hymn writers. What most amazed me was the omission of "Amazing Grace" from the biographical piece about writer John Newton. Of course there was a reason behind that. "Amazing Grace" was not



included in the 1940 Hymnal! Despite Newton's status as an Anglican who became a priest, "Amazing Grace" was presumably considered a folksy hymn embraced by Baptists and Methodists but not befitting the more urbane Episcopalian repertoire.

2. We have several exciting musical happenings coming up. On Saturday, April 27 we will once again enjoy a Celtic service featuring Beverly DiPaolo on flute. Sunday, May 5 will be our next hymn sing streamed from Nelson Hall. Then on Sunday, June 23 I am delighted to have the super-talented Joe Dudzinski substituting for me. Joe is firmly rooted in the Episcopalian tradition, having served Christ Church in Plymouth and St. Peter's in Osterville. Later in the summer we will have another special Saturday service which we will know more about by the time you read this column.

Diocesan Counsel had a retreat where they discussed the INVITE, WELCOME, CONNECT program, and the standards for Diocesan and Congregational Alcohol Policies concerning Clergy and Lay Persons.

Canon Kelly O'Connell announced new clergy: Alan Hesse at St. John's, Sandwich, Peter Feltman-Mahan at Church of the Messiah, Woods Hole and Melissa Howell at Christ Church, Plymouth. St Mary's of Barnstable is interviewing rector candidates, and St. Christopher's of Chatham is in the self-study phase. St. Peter's on the Canal, in Buzzards Bay is looking for part time Clergy.

Canon O'Connell also mentioned that there are now, once again, 3 Regional Canons. Martha Hubbard, back from sabbatical; new, Gregory Perez and herself. "Maybe things will get back to normal".

FROM THE PRIEST ASSOCIATE - Palm Sunday and the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ

On Sunday, March 24th, Palm Sunday, we will be presenting a dramatic reading of the Passion at the 10 a.m. Service. This happens in place of the regular Gospel Proclamation. This year, I will be organizing a small group of people who will dramatically read the Passion, with the Congregation taking the part of the Crowd. We will also use a special edition of the Passion



the Congregation taking the part of the Crowd. We will also use a special edition of the Passion, developed by the Church's Lectionary translators, to take away the traditional tendency to cast blame upon the Jews for the crucifixion of Christ. This edition of the Passion is a Semitic passion, sensitive to all cultures historically present at the time of the crucifixion. Below are some historical notes which help explain our inclusive redaction of the Passion on Palm Sunday.

A note about Anti-Semitism and this Redaction of The Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ
Most translations of the Passion of our Lord, including the New Revised Standard Version which is read at
public services in this Church, render the Greek word *loudaioi* as, the Jews. Listening to the reading of the
Passion, one might assume that the authors believe that the whole of the Jewish Nation was set against Jesus,
and that resistance against Him could be understood in ethnic terms. The story went as follows: the Jews set
out to get Jesus; they arranged His arrest; rigged His trial and conviction; and thus are responsible for His
death. This rash generalization might easily be derived from reading the Passion, and as a result, the history of
Christianity could be read as a history of reviling the Jews for what was considered their part in the
crucifixion of Jesus. So it was, that support was found in the Passion Gospel (intended as a proclamation of the
Good News of God's saving acts) for a vicious and cruel anti-Semitism, a system of racism and prejudice that
resulted in discrimination, injustice, exploitation and genocide.

In New Testament times, *Ioudaioi*, Judeans, was primarily a geographical denotation within Palestine. Among Gentiles and the Jews of the Diaspora, it had a secondary religious meaning. For the Jews of Palestine, *Israel* was the name they used to describe themselves. Non-Judean Jews would be called *Ioudaioi* simply because they too had the religion proper to the *territory* of Judea. There are many instances in the Passion when it is clear that *hoi loudaioi* refers to the Sanhedrin and its officers. Just as not all Judeans were against Jesus, so only certain ones among the Jewish authorities were opposed to Him. People (individuals and groups) chose to respond to Jesus in ways that were personal to them. Some were for Him, mightily so, and some were against Him. We would do well to remember that the first Christians were Jews.

Following the lead of modern Biblical scholarship, we have decided to translate *loudaioi* as the people or the religious authorities, and we do so in a spirit of repentance for the anti-Semitism that has too often been supported by these passages, and with the commitment to honor the Jewish heritage on which Christianity is built.

Takeaway Meal/Paper Pantry Report - February 2024 was Takeaway Meal Program number 84. This month 255 people received food and personal hygiene products. This marks seven years for TM/PP and over 20 years for the Paper Pantry.

HATS OFF to both programs for the ministry you provide to the Cape Cod community!
Since March 2023 we served **900 Attendees** representing **2,489 Adults** and **408 Children** totaling **2,897**. This is nearly 500 more than our 6thyear.

THANK YOU – to all at St. David's who give time and home-baked brownies. Special thanks to the monthly contribution of fruit by a faithful parishioner to help keep our costs down. Thanks to Stop and Shop for bread, and to Cape Cod Commercial Fishermen's Alliance for fish chowder and their new *Clam Chowder*. We gave out samples of Clam Chowder and a bean salad that was made by a Barnstable County nutritionist. Leftover food items are now taken to the CHAMP House in Hyannis.

Many thanks for your donations to the Paper Pantry, and to Cape Cod Family Resource Center for donating toothbrush, toothpaste and dental floss kits. Our total distributed hygiene items included- 180 bars of soap, 95 tubes of toothpaste, 180 rolls of paper towels and 275 rolls of toilet paper, 95 bottles of shampoo and Kleenex. Our Public Health Nurse distributed COVID test kits. With SNAP benefits decreasing, these supplies are even more important to attendees.

We celebrate financial support from parishioners of St. David's, the United Way, The Hunger Food Network, The Cape Cod Needy Fund, The Retired Men's Club of Cape Cod, The Cape and Islands Deanery, The Yarmouth Rotary Club, The Aid to the Homeless Fund, The John B. Tew Family Fund of the Cape Cod Foundation, friends of St. David's, and The Special Ministries Committee of St. David's. We thank Flower Angels for providing flower arrangements.

DYECH CARING CARDS - We move into March with a little warmer weather (I hope) and the thoughts of Spring and Easter coming! I want to report on two very important subjects. First off, our Caring Card sales for the four Sundays in February totaled \$5,455. This is not very good, and I know we can do better. That averages around \$1,350. a week. Remember our goal was \$1,500 per week. The second item is that DYECH just gave Housing Assistance Corporation

\$6,000 to be used for their Homeless Prevention Program. That is excellent. Our last donation to them was in December, so this one was over a 2 month period. HAC can help a lot of folks with a bill of some kind, so they do not lose their home. This could be a rent payment, utility, car repair, etc. Do you think we can do better in March? There are five Sundays in March, and we should be able to get to around \$7,000. Remember, for every card purchased at least 5 per cent goes to HAC....some cards give more. For the remaining Sundays in Lent, please make it a practice to purchase cards from DYECH and our sales will be elevated along with our donation to a great program. Claire Tyner, Sec., DYECH
