FROM THE RECTOR

"There is something invigorating about treading on the edge of the familiar, pressing beyond the border of the known, and reaching out to new horizons." David Adam, Border Lands

As I assemble a journal for the pilgrims going to St. David's Cathedral, Wales on May 23, I keep returning to the question of why we go on pilgrimage in the first place? We are all seekers, like the first disciples who

dropped their nets to follow Jesus. We proclaim in our baptism that we will follow Jesus wherever he leads. Pilgrimage is an opportunity to pare away our daily comforts and distractions, put ourselves in a vulnerable position as travelers, and expose ourselves to dependence upon God as our guide. The pilgrims who go to Wales will immerse themselves in Celtic scenery, history, language, and prayer. We hope to discover what Timothy Joyce describes in Celtic Christianity as "a faith hammered out on the margins of Europe ... close to nature, to the elements, to God, ... and often to poverty." We will be proud to make our communal gift to the Cathedral Choral Scholars who honor St. David, "a help to the needy and a friend to the lonely, a father to the faithful," as sung in the oratorio *Dewi Sant* by Arwel Hughes. Six pilgrims will return on May 31, while my husband and I stay for an extra week in Wales to begin my sabbatical.

It occurs to me that as a congregation, you will be going on your own pilgrimage throughout the summer, with David Angelica and Marilyn as your spiritual guides. You may feel things get shaken up even sooner. Over the course of May, there will be a different preacher in the pulpit each Sunday: Mark Anschutz, me, Kelly O'Connell, and David Angelica. I hope the different voices prepare you to start seeing and knowing God's glory in new ways. I leave you with this prayer to ask God's blessings until I rejoin you all September 17.

VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS FROM APRIL 15th MEETING

- Parishioners continue to support DYECH, the Food Pantry, the TakeAway Meal and Paper Pantry programs financially and with their time.
- The Vestry is concerned with the condition of the appliances and equipment in the Nelson Hall kitchen. A motion was passed to authorize the expenditure of up to \$1,500 to get a professional cleaning of the appliances and equipment before they are moved out of the kitchen for the floor replacement. The Vestry also discussed locking the door when groups do not reserve use of the kitchen when using the main hall and making groups using the kitchen aware that it must be left "as clean as it was found".
- A motion was passed to spend up to \$150 to install a push bar on the Common Room door that leads out to the parking lot and the Mission House.
- Lenten and Easter events (Newcomers Brunch, Episcopal 101, Barbara Rockefeller's art display, etc., were well attended. Special thanks was expressed to members of the Vestry and others who worked to put on these events.)
- On May 21, we will host our Regional Canon Kelly O'Connell; Rev. David Angelica will be here starting May 28; Sue Lederhouse will be here July 16 and August 20 when David is at St. Andrew's; Andi's return will be Sunday, September 17; Bishop Gallagher will be here on October 15.
- Diane Gibson's funeral will be May 13th at 10:30; Jan Darling's funeral will be May 20th at 3:00.
- Planning continues for the formation of a Men's Club.
- Plans are underway to provide transportation and a meal for parishioners who are no longer able to get to church in person.
- Planning also continues for fundraising events such as the Food Truck without a Truck
 (July 8) the Christmas Fair (November 11) and a Tea and Fashion Show (date TBD).

NEWS FROM THE DEACON - The Rhythm * of the Psalms

Among my favorite memories of my years in formation to become a deacon are the times every month when we'd join the Sisters of St. Anne in worship in their beautiful chapel at their convent, Bethany House, in Arlington MA. Our monthly formation weekends began, for example, with Evening Prayer on Friday. The quietly contemplative tone of the service drew us together. Shedding the week's distractions, our hearts began opening to God and each other.

For me, a highlight of the service was praying the Psalm together. We sat in the choir area of the chapel, two rows on each side, facing the folks across the aisle. We spoke the appointed Psalm antiphonally: folks on one side said a verse; the other side then said the next one. Sister Ana Clara, the Mother Superior, set the pace. With her gentle and determined voice, she led us in a measured tempo. She taught us to breathe at the asterisks - a silent full breath in and a silent full breath out - before proceeding to speak the rest of a verse. Another silent breath in and out before the next verse. Each fall, when we returned from our summer break and new postulants joined our ranks, it took some effort for Sister Ana Clara to get us all back into the collective rhythm of the Psalm. The result was worth the effort. The cadence drew me individually and us as a community together, away from our crazy lives and into sacred space.

In his book, Answering God: The Psalms as Tools for Prayer, Eugene H. Peterson writes an entire chapter about the rhythm of the Psalms. Here's a sample :

"The pre-Genesis condition of the cosmos is our own inner life - tohu and bohu - without form and void. Things are not right; we are not right. ... And so we pray. Directed by the Psalms, we begin our praying by listening. ... Disorder gives way, piecemeal, to order. Chaos becomes cosmos. The language is rhythmic - cadence and repetition and rhyme. God speaks creation into existence. ...

"All the psalms are given to us in the form of poetry. Prayer is rhythmic, using language to integrate our blessings to our breathing, adjusting the internal rhythms of our lives to the external rhythms of creation and covenant. Our core being is expressed in language that follows the rhythm of our life, inhalation and exhalation. ... We can, of course, pray in a frenzy, thrashing about. Much prayer necessarily begins that way, but we pray better, and best, when we let the rhythms of the creating word of God work themselves into the rhythms of our living." (pp 59-60)

It turns out our Book of Common Prayer offers useful guidance on pages 582-583, "Concerning the Psalter," for praying the Psalms individually and in community. Here's a snippet:

"The version of the Psalms which follows is set out in lines of poetry. The lines correspond to Hebrew versification, which is not based on meter or rhyme, but on parallelism of clauses, a symmetry of form and sense. The parallelism can take the form of similarity ... or of contrast. ... An asterisk divides each verse into two parts for reading or chanting. In reading, a distinct pause should be made at the asterisk." [Breathe in and out.]

Our Service of Tenebrae on Maundy Thursday evening of Holy Week features our lectors and congregation reading several Psalms, as the candles on the stripped altar are extinguished one by one. This year, I noticed, we all had some difficulty getting together on the rhythm of the Psalms, especially on what to do with the asterisks. It brought me back to those early fall formation weekends with Sister Ana Clara, when she gently and firmly guided our cacophonous individual voices into a shared communal rhythm, noticing the words and their meaning. In our Sunday and Daily Liturgy of the Word, the Psalm gives us our turn to respond as the whole church to the Scripture lessons * and to deepen our connections with God and one another.

MESSAGE FROM THE MUSIC DIRECTOR ...

We are indeed blessed to sing an abundance of hymns that have successfully weathered the test of time. Yet they comprise a surprisingly small fraction of the multitude of worship songs that have been written over the past few centuries. Our first observation is likely to be how dated the words are. As I revisit my collection of old hymnals, however, what jumps out at me is the sheer variety of subjects covered in these works.



One pervasive theme during the Victorian era was saving the lost, wandering soul. Many hymns evoked images of a sinner fighting to stay alive in the tossing waves, swimming toward the welcoming lighthouse that was God.

Brightly beams our Father's mercy from His lighthouse evermore But to us He gives the keeping of the lights along the shore Let the lower lights be burning! Send a gleam across the wave! Some poor fainting, struggling seaman you may rescue, you may save

Salvation could also come by way of the pleas from the sinner's sainted mother.

In a lonely graveyard, many miles away
Lies your dear old mother 'neath the cold, cold clay
Mem'ries oft returning of her tears and sighs
If you love your mother, meet her in the skies

Listen to her pleading, "Wand'ring boy, come home" Lovingly, entreating, do not longer roam Let your manhood waken, heav'nward lift your eyes If you love your mother, meet her in the skies

Some songs extolled the virtues of a Christian marriage providing the foundation for a happy home. Imagine the following text set to a ponderous German chorale in a minor key -- which it was.

O blessed home where man and wife Together lead a godly life By deeds their faith confessing There many a happy day is spent There Jesus gladly will consent To tarry with His blessing

One of the most prevalent subjects was death. Here is the first of eleven verses for a classic example.

Who knows when death may overtake me?

Time passes by, my end draws near How swiftly can my breath forsake me How soon can life's last hour appear My God for Jesus' sake I pray Thy peace may bless my dying day

And of course, the end times.

Day of wrath, O day of mourning

See fulfilled the Prophet's warning

Heaven and earth in ashes burning

There were eighteen more verses. Happy spring!

TAKEAWAY MEAL/PAPER PANTRY REPORT FOR APRIL 2023

On April 19, 2023, we held Takeaway Meal number 74. We have are blessed to be able to provide for the needs of Cape Cod and are thankful for the support we have received over the years from St. David's and organizations and the people of Cape Cod. We planned for and served 220 meals. In addition, the 71attendees took home bags of personal hygiene items for themselves and family members. Items distributed included 100 bars of personal soap, 60 tubes of toothpaste, 100 rolls of paper towels and 160 rolls of toilet paper. The Fishermen's Alliance provided several cases of fish stew and haddock chowder. Stop and Shop provided many loaves of bread. Each month, we give out hundreds of personal hygiene items and your donations ensure that all attendees get what they need. Soap, tooth paste, deodorant, and shampoo are always appreciated. With SNAP benefits being reduced, these bags will be even more important to the attendees. Volunteers are always welcome on the Tuesday before the event at 12:30 to help assemble these bags. Covid test kits were distributed free of charge. The recipients of the meal and personal hygiene products included several St. David's families. We have received financial donations from parishioners, The United Way, The Hunger Food Network (also supports The Paper Pantry), The Episcopal City Mission, and a friend of St. David's. We received several gift cards from The Major Crisis Relief Fund to purchase food items from Stop and Shop. We recently received a grant from The Aid to The Homeless Fund and John B Tew Family Fund of The Cape Cod Foundation. The Retired Men's Club of Cape Cod and The Yarmouth Rotary also donated funds. We give special thanks to the Special Ministries Committee of St. David's for their ongoing financial support of the program. Paper bags were generously provided by the members of St. David's. We once again have a large inventory of bags and do not need more for the time being.

An announcement about the programs was placed in The Cape Cod Times and sent to the COAs in surrounding communities. The next meal will be on Wednesday, May 17th. We plan on serving and BJ's chicken. Helpers are needed to prepare and pack food on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, starting at 9:00 AM and to distribute meals Wednesday afternoon, starting at 12:45 PM. We REALLY NEED cookies and brownies (NO NUTS), preferably home baked. Items from the grocery store are also welcome. Please note they should be dropped by 9:00 AM Tuesday morning in either Nelson Hall or The Common Room. "Thank You" to everyone who makes this event happen!
